The Community

The San Marcos Unified School District is located in Southern California between the city of San Diego 30 miles to the south and the city of Los Angeles 90 miles to the north. Major industries in San Marcos are classified as technical and light industry. Palomar Community College is located in San Marcos, as is California State University San Marcos. San Marcos is a rapidly growing community with a population of approximately 95,261 and has much to offer its citizens.

The School

San Marcos High School is a comprehensive high school fed by three middle schools, which serve students who matriculate from eleven elementary schools. The school's mission statement and guiding principles are based on the philosophy that every student can and will learn and a belief in a professional learning community that embraces our motto "Empowering personal growth and honorable contributions of all Knights."

San Marcos High School was established in 1960, and has a current enrollment of approximately 3,500 students grades 9-12. As an accredited comprehensive high school, the curriculum is broad based, accommodating the needs of all ability levels. San Marcos High School has been named a California Distinguished School by the California Department of Education.

As of 2014, San Marcos High School has been rebuilt into a state of the art facility. Every classroom has 21st century technology including interactive projectors and touchscreen computers. In addition to 10 computer labs, fourteen computer carts are shared throughout the campus. The design of the new campus is one of collaboration and transparency. Teachers have collaborative office spaces and students have interior collaborative spaces, including the Student Union, all with an abundance of windows, soft seating, tables, and chairs.

School-Wide Objectives

Students of San Marcos High School are self-regulated learners that will graduate as empowered individuals with 21st century skills and attitudes to positively contribute to their personal, local, and global communities. In order to do this, throughout their time at SMHS, students will demonstrate growth in their ability to:

- -Think critically and creatively in learning and life
- -Produce various forms of effective communication
- -Productively interact with collaborative environments for learning and problem solving

All classes meet five hours per week. The 80 remaining credits are earned in elective, vocational, or college prep classes.

Curriculum

San Marcos High School offers a wide range of Honors (12 total), AP (21 total), College Prep and Career Technical Education (CTE) Courses to meet the needs of all students. Accelerated students are challenged by a series of Honors and Advanced Placement Courses.

A comprehensive Special Education program is provided for students with learning disabilities. English Language (EL) and co-taught college prep classes are offered for students who are not proficient in English. Many students take classes at Palomar College prior to high school graduation. We are also proud of our AVID program that received recognition as a National Demonstration and Program of Distinction.

College Admissions

For the graduating class of 2018, 70% met the UC/CSU A-G subject requirements.

Approximately 49% of our graduates enroll at a four-year university and the remaining 51% enroll in a community college, enter the workforce or join the military.

The graduating class of 2018 received over \$2.5 million in scholarships and merit aid.

San Marcos Unified School District does not rank.

Honors and Advanced Placement

Honors and Advanced Placement classes are available in English, world languages, math, science, visual/performing arts, engineering and social science. Students may also take courses through Palomar College, a community college in the City of San Marcos.

Athletics and Extra Curricular Activities

San Marcos High School competes in the CIF San Diego Avocado League in both boys and girls sports at the Frosh, J.V., and Varsity levels. Our teams are very successful and have captured many league and CIF titles. In 2017 –2018 all 24 varsity sports made the playoffs. Our award-winning dance program has both men's and women's teams. Jazz, Concert, and Marching Band, Drama, and Chorus round out our performing arts program. We are very proud of our teams and individual athletic accomplishments as well as what our athletic programs do to motivate young students to be responsible citizens.



Excalibur Knights

Students with a 4.0 GPA or higher are invited to apply for this position. They go through an application process, which includes an interview. 24 students out of the 80+ applicants are chosen to represent SMHS. They visit middle schools to mentor eighth graders academically and socially. They also serve as peer academic tutors at the high school.

Knights of the Round Table


10 seniors (of over 80 applicants) are selected through a competitive interview process with the principal. The Knights of the Round Table (KORT) conduct assemblies at local elementary schools promoting a drug and alcohol-free lifestyle.

AP Ambassadors

Eight seniors from underrepresented backgrounds who are recommended and selected by teachers, counselors and administration to encourage their peers to challenge themselves academically. They share their own experiences, challenges and successes. They provide peer tutoring, mentorship and speak at parent/student information events.

- 27 athletes from the class of 2018 signed National Letters of Intent (NLI) to play their sport in college
- In 2018, the following athletic teams won league championships: Girls Tennis, Girls Cross Country, Girls Volleyball, Boys Cross Country, Girls Soccer, Wrestling, Boys Soccer, Boys Basketball, Boys Golf, Boys Tennis, Boys & Girls Lacrosse, Boys & Girls Swimming, Baseball and Softball
