## SMUSD graduation requirements for the Class of 2023

*indicates requirement is different from those of the classes of 2019 and earlier

## Minimum A-G requirements for CSU/UC admissions

SAN MARCOS HIGH SCHOOL COUNSELING DEPARTMENT Frequently Asked Questions while choosing courses for $9^{\text {th }}$ grade

Please see the Class of 2023 graduation requirements and the University A-G requirements listed in this packet

- How many classes will my $9^{\text {th }}$ grader take? All $9^{\text {th }}$ graders will have six classes. Students in Marching Band will also have a $7^{\text {th }}$ period band class. $9^{\text {th }}$ graders must take English, math, fulfill the PE requirement (options below), a science (Biology of the Living Earth or Agricultural Biology) and then have two electives (many choose to start their world language requirement and then choose one additional elective or are assigned to Algebra support by their $8^{\text {th }}$ grade math teacher.
- What is this new course "Biology of the Living Earth"? Don't freshmen take Biology? California has adopted the Next Generation Science Standards. Biology of the Living Earth explores relationships between the living and nonliving components of Earth's systems. By using science and engineering practices, cross-cutting disciplinary concepts, and evidence from experiments, research, and observations, students will learn how to formulate questions, evaluate claims, and develop models to make interpretations and investigate the natural world. This course meets the life science requirement for college admissions and graduation.
- What is the difference between AP/Honors and college prep? College prep courses meet requirements for four-year university subject area admissions. Honors/AP classes are more advanced, move at a faster pace, and require a more rigorous workload. They attract students who can learn independently and do not require a lot of repetition of new material. More information about each Honors/AP course can be found on the school website as well as the digital course catalog on the counseling page.
- How can my student learn more about the expectations and content in SMHS AP/Honors courses?

On the left side under Site Shortcuts, go to "\#CHALLENGEACCEPTED" For each course students can see a sample course syllabus, which provides a course overview and course goals. Then students can click on "Testimonials" for each AP/Honors course. Here you can read how SMHS students rated the course in four key areas:

1. The Level of Difficulty of this Course
2. The Time Commitment to this Course Outside of School
3. The Amount of Academic Supports this Course Provides
4. The Continued Level of Interest in this Course

- Should my student take all honors courses? It is not necessary to take all honors or AP courses in order to be admitted to a four-year university; however highly selective universities do expect rigorous coursework. SMHS recommends that students take more advanced courses in subject areas in which they have an aptitude or passion. Ideally, a student finds a healthy balance between academics, extracurricular activities, social time and relaxation. Students should take into account their academic strengths and outside activities that will affect their study time. Colleges make the same recommendation.
- Now that $\mathbf{9}^{\text {th }}$ grade history is no longer required for graduation, should my student take it? Students who plan to take $10^{\text {th }}$ grade AP World History should be enrolled in a $9^{\text {th }}$ grade honors history to prepare for the curriculum and learn about the tools and study skills they will need in AP World. Students who enroll in any of these advanced social science courses will not have a lower level course to replace history. It is considered an elective and is year-long. Students will not be able to drop. Please choose carefully and be certain that you can complete this rigorous coursework.
- Can a student take $9^{\text {th }}$ grade history and then not take World History in $10^{\text {th }}$ grade? No, $10^{\text {th }}$ grade World History is a district graduation requirement (along with $11^{\text {th }}$ grade U.S. History and $12^{\text {th }}$ grade Government) and must be successfully completed even if a student completed a year of $9^{\text {th }}$ grade history.
- Can students drop or change courses once school has started? SMHS courses are year-long courses. Course changes will not be permitted once school starts because the class periods and teacher staffing will be set based on student requests from the previous spring. As in past years, we anticipate that all electives will be closed/full once school begins. Before choosing AP/Honors courses, please be sure to see the course requirements and information on the school website in order to make an informed decision.
- Can we request a specific teacher or class period? In order to fairly accommodate a population of approximately 3,600 students, school policy does not allow for teacher requests. Students are scheduled into classes randomly by the computer and in order of grade level (seniors get priority, then juniors, etc.) Due to the limited number of sections we can offer, an elective class may fill so students are not scheduled into their st $^{\text {st }}$ choice elective; therefore, all students are asked to provide alternates.
- My student is an athlete. Does he/she have to take PE? What about independent study PE (ISPE)? SMUSD requires two years of PE, which can be fulfilled with PE, Dance, 4 years of Marching Band, or AFJROTC. Weight Training or Football/Baseball/Basketball Team Sports may be taken beginning in $10^{\text {th }}$ grade. ISPE is only for pre-Olympic level athletes who must submit an application and must be approved in the spring. - How is math placement determined for incoming $9^{\text {th }}$ graders? $9^{\text {th }}$ graders are placed in high school math by their $8^{\text {th }}$ grade math teacher's recommendation, which is determined by results from the spring MDTP and the student's course grade. - What college resources does the counseling office provide for students and parents? The SMHS counseling department offers numerous parent college workshops and seminars. Due to the size of the school, we offer these presentations in a group format. The schedule is posted on the College and Career Center website, the SMHS website and in the counseling newsletter (information below). Counselors conduct classroom presentations, then hold one-on-one meetings with each student during the course selection period in the spring. Counselors also encourage students to attend walk-in office hours at break, lunch and after school.
- In senior year, students are invited to attend college application and financial aid workshops (CSU, UC, Common App, community college and FAFSA).
- We have a College and Career Center (C3) where students and parents can obtain information on work permits, financial aid, college, jobs, military, scholarships etc. (760) 290-2226
- Our district has partnered with the California College Guidance Initiative (CCGI). Through this partnership, each SMUSD student will have a personalized account on www.californiacolleges.edu. Students can create their four-year plan of study, research their interests, discover potential careers, access financial aid resources and conduct college searches.
